Coming Soon: A Campaign to Uphold Jewish Burial Traditions

Cremation is on the rise among Jews. Yet for millennia, Jewish tradition has held that burial is a sacred mitzvah, honoring the soul and affirming our belief in its eternal journey. On August 26–27, the St. Louis Jewish Burial Foundation will launch a two-day online fundraising campaign to help ensure that the St. Louis Jewish community is educated about the importance of a traditional halachic burial — a final act of kindness reflecting dignity, and compassion.

We are a volunteer-led nonprofit committed to reversing the trend toward cremation through outreach, advertising, and speaking engagements. Our mission is simple: to preserve the timeless values of Jewish burial and make them accessible to all.

A letter to the NHBZ Congregation

To my Dear Friends at NHBZ,

As my time serving NHBZ comes to an end, I would like to share with you a few thoughts and feelings. It has been a real pleasure to serve as the Rabbi of the weekday morning minyan and on occasion deliver the Shabbos morning drasha. I am grateful for having had the opportunity to daven and study Torah together, and I cherish the relationships that I have developed with many of you. The friendly banter, the camaraderie and Howard's coffee make the minyan a warm place to come, even on the coldest of mornings.

Each day after davening I had the opportunity to share a brief thought. We focused on understanding the words of davening, as well as the fundamental concepts of prayer and Judaism in general. known as the ARI or the ARIZaL. In addition to meaning "lion," ARI is an acronym for "Eloki ("G-dly") Rabbi Yitzchak"; ZaL is an acronym for zichrono liverachah, "[may] his memory [be] for blessing." Also referred to as ARI Hakadosh, "the holy ARI" or ARIZaL Hachai, "the living ARIZaL," he is the source of our shul's *nusach*. In Safad he studied briefly under the master Kabbalist, Rabbi Moshe of Cordovero, known as the RaMaK. The Jews there performed a special service to welcome the Sabbat. The Friday night service can be traced to The Ari and his students of Safad. The Lecha Dodi hymn was composed by Rabbi Shlomo Alkabetz, who lived in Safed at the same time as the ARI. Every week, the ARI and his students would leave the city, and, facing the setting sun, they recited the Psalms that have since become standard in nearly every synagogue around the world.

Va'eschanan: Listen to Shema's Inner Message

Often, in conversation, one person will ask, "Do you hear what I'm saying?" This actually means, "Have my words been heard and understood?"...Truly hearing another means being fully present...

So indispensable is the sense of hearing that Jewish law rules that one who is responsible for another's deafness is obligated to compensate him for the complete value of his life. It's as if he robbed another of all his faculties. By contrast, if someone is found guilty of causing another to become blind, Jewish law states that he must compensate him for the loss of his eye only, reflecting the prominence with which the Torah regards the sense of hearing.

Spiritual Hearing -- Va'etchanan includes the first paragraph of Judaism's main affirmation of belief: the Shema. The word *shema* means "hear." The Shema is a Divine call to the soul to perceive G-d's oneness. A Jew is to be fully engaged two times daily when reciting this expression of faith. It's an opportunity to connect with G-d and to build a stronger relationship with Him. When reciting the *shema*, we "hear" in order to deeply understand and integrate the meaning of the words. This daily integration is spiritually and mentally rejuvenating. It's the antidote to an attitude of same old, same old, dullness.

The Connection of the Shema and the 10 Commandments -- When the Torah was given at Mount Sinai, all of Israel proclaimed in unison: "We will do (*na'aseh*) and we will hear (*venishema*). At Sinai, the giving of the Ten Commandments was accompanied by both natural and metaphysical phenomena. The Torah describes that "all the people *saw the sounds* of the thunder and the lightning." Rashi explains that the people actually saw that which was usually heard.

The last Hebrew letter of the word *shema* is an *ayin*, which means "eye." Perhaps in this context the word *shema* can be understood to integrate both hearing and seeing into one expansive dimension. It connects us to the heightened consciousness that we experienced witnessing the revelation of the Torah at Sinai. The juxtaposition of the Shema following the 10 Commandments in this Torah reading suggests an inner connection.

Two Larger Letters: 'Ayin' and 'Dalet' -- Sometimes, a letter in the Torah will be written larger or smaller than normal. This anomaly is to call our attention to a deeper underlying idea or teaching. In the Shema, both the *ayin* in the word *shemA* ("hear") and the *dalet* in the word *echaD* ("one") are enlarged. These two letters spell the Hebrew word *eid*, which means "witness." This is the only occurrence within the entire Torah where two enlarged letters appear in a single verse.

From this, we learn that the mission of the Jewish people is to be a holy nation, as the prophet Isaiah stated, "You are my witnessess." Our mission began with Abraham and will continue into the future as the world fully recognizes the one true reality.

Furthermore, when those letters (ayin and dalet) are reversed, they spell the word da, which means "know." The Shema merges faith with knowledge. These eternally relevant words have empowered the Jewish people in every generation to have their faith become so strong that we know it...
